




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

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FOREWORD AND METHODOLOGY

The semi-annual CEE By the Numbers report – a compilation and presentation of hard data about the lawyers at leading law firms of Central and Eastern Europe – is a source of real pride at CEE Legal Matters, This report is our third, following the first in April 2014 (published as part of our special Glass CEEling' issue) and the second, in August 2019, and like its predecessors it includes information not only about the size and gender-breakdown of the leading law firms in the region, but also allows readers to track and measure the growth (or decline) of those numbers over previous years.

As a result, this report is extremely valuable, providing law firms as well as critics, scholars, and other observers valuable information about CEE's legal markets.

We are grateful to those firms that took the time to respond to our inquiries on the matter, and we hope they – and everyone else – will give us their feedback on the issue. We look forward to receiving (and publishing, if possible) that feedback over the months to come.

Methodology

CEE Legal Matters covers the legal markets of Albania, Austria, Belarus, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Greece, Hungary, Kosovo, Latvia, Lithuania, Moldova, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Poland, Romania, Russia, Serbia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Turkey, and Ukraine. The data in this report was gathered between July 1 and July 31, 2019, from the websites of 901 law firms (with a total of 1200 offices) ranked by Chambers & Partners and Legal 500 in any practice area in each of those 24 countries (except those law firms which do not distinguish between partners and associates on their websites or which do not list their associates), and from 20 law firms in the region that were not ranked

but which are part of regional networks that include ranked firms. Each firm for which information was gathered was also contacted and invited to confirm or update the data.



Definitions

For the purpose of the survey, "lawyer" means all lawyers, at all levels working as full time fee earners (*i.e.*, junior associate, associate, senior associate, (of) counsel, attorney, partner *etc.*).

"Regional" law firms are those that are headquartered in CEE or elsewhere in Continental Europe (e.g. Germany) and which have offices in at least three CEE countries. Firms with offices only in in one country or in two neighboring jurisdictions (such as those with only offices in the Czech Republic and Slovakia, or in Serbia and Montenegro) were categorized as "Domestic."

"International" law firms are those with headquarters outside of Continental Europe but with at least one office in the region.

For the sake of simplicity and consistency, for the purposes of this report, the law firms affiliated with the Big 4 accounting firms (i.e, KPMG, EY, Deloitte, and PWC) or International firms that are branded differently to satisfy local bar regulations were treated part of those organizations. For example, Reff and Associates, which is affiliated with Deloitte Legal in Romania, was treated as Deloitte Legal, while Balcioglu Selcuk Akman Keki Avukatlik Ortakligi, the Turkish firm associated with Dentons, was treated as Dentons.

Number of Law Firms

Which CEE country has the most law firms ranked by Chambers & Partners or Legal 500?

Russia leads the pack, with 130 firms ranked in either in 2019. Turkey, which had the most ranked firms in both 2014 and 2017, has now dropped to the 6th spot with 81.

Aside from Russia, Turkey was overtaken in the number of firms recognized as competing for high-end work in Poland, Austria, Ukraine, and Greece.

LEGAL MARKET SIZE AUGUST 2019



The number of firms ranked by *Chambers & Partners* and *Legal 500* has expanded significantly across the entire region over the past few years, with that number growing by ten or more in all but five of the countries where data was available in 2017 (not enough firms were ranked that year in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Montenegro, Moldova, or Kosovo).

The significance of this trend, of course, is debatable. Taken at face value, it would appear to reflect an increase in the number of skilled practitioners and firms capable of providing high-level service, but it may also reflect an increased focus on the region – and therefore greater market awareness – by the ranking services, a change in their qualifying criteria, or a strategic decision based on other commercial considerations.

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Number of Lawyers

On the other hand, perhaps cynicism is unwarranted, as growth can be found in the number of lawyers at ranked firms as well, with every CEE country except North Macedonia and Latvia seeing an increase.

Based on the last CEE By The Numbers report, between 2014 and 2017 Poland led the way with a total increase of 987 lawyers at ranked firms, while Turkey showed an additional 714 lawyers.

Russia's increase of 1137 lawyers at ranked firms since the 2017 report (and 1,530 lawyers more than the 2014 report) is the largest of all CEE countries. Poland, while adding fewer lawyers at ranked firms (894) over the last two years, has added the most over the last five, with a total of 1881 more than in the 2014 report.

Latvia, who lost 56 over the last two years, still has 55 more lawyers working for ranked firms relative to 2014. North Macedonia is the only market to have fewer in total, with 6 lawyers less compared to 2014.

Average Size of Law Firms

With an average of 31.5 lawyers per ranked law firm (ALPRF), Poland leads the way in this category by a considerable margin, followed by the Czech Republic, which had 23.21 ALPRF. Russia, which has the most ranked law firms in CEE (see p. 6) has 20.62 ALPRF.

Only six of the 24 surveyed markets had an average ranked law firm size of over 20 lawyers, with 11 jurisdictions having an average of between 10 and 20 ALPRF. However, although Albania was the only market examined in 2017 with a ALPRF of less than ten (it had an average of 5.9 lawyers per ranked firm that year), seven markets have an ALPRF of under ten in 2019. Still, it should be noted that the ALPRF figure was not available for four of those seven markets in 2017 (Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, Moldova, Montenegro), as there were too few firms ranked at the time.

Changing Team Sizes

Surprisingly, the average size of ranked law firms has *decreased* across most of CEE, with only two jurisdictions (Turkey and Serbia) showing an uptick. Of the 20 countries from which data was available in 2017.

Austria and Poland are the biggest losers, with both markets showing a greater than ten percent decrease in the average size of ranked firms.

Size vs Number of Firms

Again, the data can be understood in several different ways. While it might appear that firms across CEE are streamlining, a more likely explanation is that the number of ranked firms reflects, at least in part, splintering of the markets, with spin-offs and new challengers able to challenge more established firms for dominance (see table on page 8).

Looking at the two data sets in parallel shows that the average size of ranked law firms in Austria and Poland stands out far less when it is remembered that 55 and 50 additional firms are ranked than were in 2017, respectively, suggesting that new quality firms may have taken headcount from the existing market leaders. Ukraine is one market where the average number of lawyers per ranked firm remains essentially identical, despite the addition of 56 new firms to the list of firms ranked in one or the other directory.

Number of Firms / GDP

One method of assessing the level of saturation in each market is to compare the number of ranked firms in each market to that country's gross domestic product (as obtained by the World Bank in 2018). When seen through this lens, at least, Montenegro appears to be the most crowded market, with Russia being the least crowded.

2017 Saturation / Growth

In 2017 Russia, Turkey, Belarus, Slovakia, Austria, Greece, and Albania were the least saturated markets based on the ranked-law-firm-to-GDP metric. For the most part, these are the markets where the number of ranked firms have increased the most since 2017 as well, although Turkey, which was the second *least* saturated in 2017, increased by only 11 firms. For its part, Ukraine was in the upper half of the table in terms of saturation in 2017 but registered the 2nd greatest growth in the number of ranked firms.

When, instead, we compare the number of lawyers at ranked law firms to that country's GDP, the least saturated two markets remain the same: Russia and Turkey.

The Baltic countries of Estonia, Lithuania, and Latvia, however, move up the table to take the first three spots, as most crowded.

Another way of evaluating the saturation level of various markets is to consider the number of ranked firms to the number of client matters in each country (as reported in CEE Legal Matters in 2017 and 2018). When seen through this lens, North Macedonia and Albania – where law firms publicize their work on very few deals – would seem to be the most saturated and the Baltic states – with strong BD departments, reporting a significantly greater amount of law firm work – the least.

And, when comparing the number of lawyers working for ranked law firms in each jurisdiction to the number of reported client matters in that country instead of the number of firms, North Macedonia maintains its first spot, Greece moves up to second place, and Russia and Turkey jump up from the middle of the table to the 3rd and 4th spots, respectively.

The Baltic states remain the least saturated markets based on this metric, but Latvia and Lithuania trade spots on the table.

We also compared the average number of deals reported by CEE Legal Matters in each market from 2014-2016 (the period analyzed for the first CEE By The Numbers report) to the average number of deals reported by CEE Legal Matters in 2017 and 2018.

Turkey had the highest drop in the number of reported deals per year, which may help explain the country no longer having the most ranked firms. On the other hand, Russia reported 13.5 fewer deals per year yet increased its number of ranked firms by 73. The number of reported deals per year increased the most in Estonia, with 52 more deals reported (on average) in 2017 and 2018 than there had been the previous three years, followed by Poland which showed an increase of 40.17.




CEE Overview: Kinds of Firms

Of the 901 law firms ranked across the surveyed countries, 827 were Domestic, 44 were International, and 30 were Regional (see definitions on page 3).

While fewer in number than their International counterparts, CEE's Regional firms have, on average, more offices in the region, at 5.26 to 4.04. International firms have a total of 175 offices across CEE, out of which 159 are ranked. Regional firms have 157 offices across CEE, out of which 117 are ranked.

By comparison, in 2017, of the 486 law firms ranked across the surveyed countries, 414 represented Domestic firms, 40 International firms, and 32 were Regional law firms.

Regional firms had a higher average number of offices in CEE (4.68) than their international counterparts (2.97) in 2017 as well, and more of the Regional offices were ranked in 2017, which pushed Regional players ahead in terms of the total number of ranked offices established in CEE: 150 total offices compared to the 119 of international firms.





Regional Firms in CEE

Due to their unique historic and geographical similarities, the Baltic States have the most Regional firms, with a large number of pan-Baltic firms. In Estonia, for instance, such firms represent 15 out of the 30 total ranked law firms.

In contrast, while Greece has a notable International firm presence, primarily as a result of its shipping industry, it has drawn little attention from Regional firms, with only one more in Kosovo, Moldova, and Turkey.

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International Firms in CEE

Although Russia ranked mid-table in terms of the number of Regional firms doing business in the country, it leads the way in the number of International firms on the ground, as 31 have offices in the largest country on the planet.

The Baltic States dropped in this ranking, with only Eversheds Sutherland and some or all of the Big 4's legal teams operating in the three countries. Bosnia and Herzegovina and Kosovo are the only two jurisdictions covered in this report without any International firm offices at all.

International Firm Coverage

CMS, with offices in 17 CEE countries, is the International firm with the largest on-the-ground footprint in the region, adding one more office since 2017 in Macedonia. It is followed by Eversheds Sutherland, which recently merged with the Dvorak Hager & Partner offices in Prague and Bratislava.

Clifford Chance, White & Case, and Norton Rose each have five offices in the region to complete the top ten. Of the 21 International firms with only one office in the region, that office is usually in Moscow.

The footprint of the Big 4's legal teams was considered separately (see page 41).

Regional Firm Coverage

Schoenherr, Wolf Theiss and IP-specializing Petosevic have the widest Regional firm footprints in CEE, as each has 13 offices across the region. And Petosevic reflects another phenomenon: In fact, three of the top ten firms with the most extensive CEE footprints are IP and trademark boutiques, often with only two or three lawyers in an office.

While not captured in the table below which lists the top 10 firms based on the number of CEE countries covered, Egorov Puginsky Afanasiev & Partners leads the way in terms of average office size with 67.67 lawyers on average in its three offices (in Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus). The Baltic States dominate the top of that league with Ellex, Sorainen, TGS Baltic, and Cobalt following one another from second to fifth place, with an average of 61.67, 54.75, 52, and 43.50 lawyers in each office, respectively.

Market Breakdown by Type

Primarily as the result of the pan-Baltic alliances, the Baltics are again at the top of the table when comparing the number of ranked Regional and International firms to that of Domestic firms. Despite the large number of International firms present, Russia follows closely behind.

Turkey and Greece share the last spot on the table with a large percentage of the ranked firms being Domestic. Indeed, out of the additional 40 ranked firms that Turkey registered in the last three years, 38 were Domestic.

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Domestics Gaining Ground

Between 2014 and 2017 the number of ranked International and Regional firms has increased only marginally (from 37 to 40 and from 30 to 32, respectively), whereas the number of ranked Domestic firms has almost doubled.

Between 2017 and 2019 the number of International ranked firms present in CEE grew by another four firms, whereas the number of ranked Regional firms went back to 30. Domestic firms recorded the greatest growth in the total number of offices of ranked firms, jumping from 228 offices in 2014 to 417 in 2017, and then to 827 in 2019. International firms had 127 ranked offices in CEE in 2014, then only 119 in 2017, before jumping up to 150 in 2019.

The lack of coverage of Big 4 offices in the previous studies should be considered when looking at these numbers as they influence the results for International firms considerably. The footprint of the Big 4's legal teams is considered as a standalone topic on page 41.

Significantly, each country showed a drop in the percentage of ranked offices that were part of International or Regional firms. In Latvia, most markedly, the percentage dropped from 86% to 45.83%, and a total of eight markets registered a drop of 20 percentage points or more. In only four countries – Bulgaria, Greece, Turkey, and Serbia – was the drop smaller than ten percentage points.

Despite several notable retreats by International firms from CEE over the past several years, as reflected in the table on page 39, there has been a notable jump in the number of International firm offices in the region, as well as in the total number of partners working at these firms.

The explanation for this potentially counter-intuitive phenomenon is the inclusion in the category of International firms of the Big 4's affiliated law firms – which account for 51 offices and 105 partners across CEE – in this year's CEE By The Numbers report.

Lawyers to Partner Ratio

In order to better understand the seniority structures of law firms across CEE we calculated the average associate to partner ratio in each country. Given the relatively small size of the markets and of the law firms working within them, it is perhaps not a big surprise that that ratio is lowest in Kosovo and highest in Ukraine.

Comparing the current numbers to those in 2014, however, it appears that more CEE jurisdictions registered growth in the period from 2014-2017 and that the growth itself was larger than it was between 2017 and 2019. And the ratio has only decreased in one country – North Macedonia – since 2014, with 11 countries overall showing a greater-than-one-point increase.

Ratio by Type of Firm

On average in CEE the lawyers-to-partner ratio tends to be lower in Domestic firms (an average of 3.66), than in Regional (4.22) and International (4.45) firms.



Relative to the number of CEE Legal Matters-reported client matters in 2017 and 2019, partners at Latvia's ranked law firms are the busiest in CEE, with an average of 1.7 client matters per partner. The number in Ukraine, which was at the top of the table in 2017 with 2.56 reported client matters per partner, has now dropped to 0.93.

In 2017 half of the 20 reviewed markets reflected more than one reported client matter per partner, with Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, and Ukraine exceeding two. In 2019, only Latvia, Estonia, Belarus, Kosovo, and Lithuania exceeded one project per partner.

Female Lawyers

The 2017 CEE By The Numbers report revealed that, at the associate level, at least, opportunities for women remain plentiful. That remains true in 2019, as women account for 55.4% of all associates at ranked firms in the region, including 74.77% of all lawyers at ranked firms in North Macedonia and over 60% of all lawyers at ranked firms in Moldova, Latvia, Romania, Montenegro, and Turkey

Of the 24 CEE jurisdictions surveyed, in fact, in only nine were fewer than 50% of all lawyers positions held by women.

Female Lawyers Evolution

The percentage of lawyers at ranked law firms that are women has decreased in all but five countries in CEE since 2017, with Latvia registering a just-above 10% increase. In Albania, 68.57 of lawyers were women in 2017, but only 39.78% in 2019.

The numbers for partners are very different. There are no female partners at ranked firms in Kosovo, and only three of the 19 partners identified at ranked firms in Montenegro are women. While Austria has many more female partners at ranked firms overall – 129 – they represent only 19.34% of the total number of partners in the country. In North Macedonia, where 74.77% of associates at ranked firms are women, only 41.94% of the partners are female. Croatia and Romania have the highest percentage of female partners, with 50.43% and 48.91% respectively.

Female Partners Evolution

Although Austria increased its lowest-in-CEE percentage of female partners at ranked law firms in 2017 by 2.03 points, it remains at the very bottom of the list. Of all markets for which data was available Croatia shows the highest increase, with 13.32% more women partners at ranked firms in 2019 than in 2017. Slovakia registered the highest decrease, with 13.67% fewer female partners at ranked law firms than two years ago. Of the 20 countries where data was available for comparison, the percentage of female partners decreased in eight.

Putting those numbers together allows us to see the revealing gap between the percentage of female lawyers and the percentage of female partners at ranked law firms across CEE. North Macedonia, which has the highest percentage of female associates, also, at 32.84%, has one of the greatest gaps between that and the percentage of female partners, although it is exceeded by the gap in Montenegro, Kosovo, and Moldova. In contrast, in large part because Croatia had the highest percentage of female partners at ranked law firms in CEE, that country has the lowest gap between that percentage and the percentage of female lawyers in the region: only 8.8%. Overall for CEE, the average gap was 19.02%.

Women in Law Evolution

The gap between female lawyers and partners at ranked firms has shrunk an average of 8.79% across CEE, and it has shrunk in all but four of the 20 countries for which data was available in both 2017 and 2019. Four markets registered a decrease of over ten percent in the gap, with three more close to that mark. Among the four countries where the gap widened, North Macedonia saw the highest increase: 16.17%.

By Type Of Firm


Looking at the averages across CEE, Domestic law firms have the highest percentage of female associates (47.91%) – slightly higher than the percentage at Regional firms (47.78%).

The same phenomenon exists at the partner level, as the percentage of female partners at ranked law firms is slightly higher than it is at their Regional counterparts. As in 2017, Regional firms have the widest gap between the percentage of female lawyers and female partners, but that gap has shrunk from 26.12 to 19.03 percentage points..
